4. <u>SUBJECT – LAW OF CONTRACT I</u>

1. <u>SUBJECT – ENGLISH II</u>

- Students will understand major and minor forms of literature.
- Students have developed interest in literature and language.

- Acquaints the students with the intricate issues of family and the law relating to religion, culture and customs of Hindus.
- Gives a practical knowledge of the existing legislations on the Hindu Marriage, Divorce, Maintenance, Property, Guardianship, Adoption and other ancillary matters.
- Introduces the students to various secular laws for the protection of women from violence and giving protection to the elderly people.

5. <u>SUBJECT – HUMAN RIGHT LAW & PRACTICE</u>

- Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the international human rights framework, its origins and justifying theories;
- Demonstrate capacity to assess how specific human rights may be asserted, enforced or violated;
- Critically evaluate the relationship between international and domestic law on human rights;

6. <u>SUBJECT – ECONOMICS III</u>

- Understanding of International Economic Relations.
- Basic concept of Agricultural Economics.
- Assess the importance of Agricultural Economics in Indian Economy.
- Explain how Socio-Economic dynamics influence policies of International Economics.

BALLB – SEMESTER IV

1. <u>SUBJECT – POLITICAL SCIENCE IV</u>

- Concept of Indian Constitution with the knowledge of Indian political and legal system
- Facility in understanding the structure of Indian political system
- This knowledge can be useful in various competitive and job-oriented exams.

2. <u>SUBJECT - HISTORY III</u>

- The focus of History II is to look at Modern times in India, the developments of modern legal procedures, laws and institutions and how they impacted the Indians and their old systems.
- The emergence of present judicial system can be traced to the historical developments in colonial India.
- The paper looks at the framing of Indian Constitution. The paper ends with postcolonial developments in India, looking up some of the current events of significance.

3. <u>SUBJECT – PUBLIC INTERNATIONAL LAW</u>

- Students should be able to understand the very dynamics of the legal practice in the various international courts and tribunals such as ICJ, ICC, etc
- Students should be able to understand the pros and cons of international law applicable to states and other possible stakeholders of international law
- Students should be able to foster a high level of understanding in the concepts such as state succession, consent of states, equality of states, Principle of Non-Interference, State Sovereignty etc.
- Students should be able to understand the emerging trends in the domain of Public International law and practice

4. <u>SUBJECT – FAMILY LAW II (MUSLIM LAW)</u>

- Guiding principles of Islamic law covering all important issues that a Muslim may come across during his life.
- Vital laws regarding marriage, dower, divorce, maintenance, inheritance (Hanfi & Shia Law), will, gift, parentage, guardianship and other family matters.
- The study will enables the students to know how they can mold their personal lives according to the principles enunciated in their course.
- Enable the students to provide legal aid according to the principles of Islamic law enunciated in their course.

5. <u>SUBJECT – ADMINISTRATIVE LAW</u>

- Students will learn about the Nature Development of law relating to administration and effective means of administrative control. The Focus is on their role in protecting the rights of individuals against abuse of administration and adjudicatory powers of the administration and liability of administrative authorities.
- Analyze and predict how unresolved or ambiguous administrative law questions could be resolved by the courts through an analysis of case law and the judicial method.
- Identify, explain and apply the principles of administrative law covered in the course.

- Identify and synthesize social theory about crime, justice, and social deviance and explain and address various obstacles and barriers experienced by individuals before, during, and after internment

- Students can identify and articulate changes that could improve peoples' lives, based on gender differences

5. <u>SUBJECT – LANGUAGE III (HINDI)</u>

- The main outcome of studying Hindi Literature will widely help to express and improve the ability to read works of literary, historical and cultural criticism.
- It also produces opportunities to maintain traditional aspects and flourishes the learner to be National friendly.
- Students can work anywhere in India, as they know Hindi Our National Language.

6. <u>SUBJECT – EQUITY AND TRUST</u>

3. <u>SUBJECT – LABOUR AND INDUSTRIAL LAW I</u>

- The laws relating to Industrial Relations, Working conditions and also learns the enquiry procedural and industrial discipline.

4. <u>SUBJECT – PROFESSIONAL ETHICS AND PROFESSIONAL ACCOUNTING</u> <u>SYSTEM</u>

- Students should be able to understand the core concepts of different doctrines and to analyze it from legal perspective in the society.

- Gives a practical knowledge of the existing legislations.
- Introduces the students to various insurance laws.
- Practical knowledge of the procedure involved in approaching the appropriate authority for seeking relief under the various legislations.

3. <u>SUBJECT – LABOUR AND INDUSTRIAL LAW – II</u>

- Resolve the labour welfare problems and Students will learn the laws relating to Industrial Relations,
- Social Security, private sector wages problems and
- Working conditions and also learn the enquiry procedural and industrial discipline.

4. <u>SUBJECT – ALTERNATE DISPUTE RESOLUTION</u>

- Students to adopt a comparative approach, drawing on the experiences of many societies and jurisdictions in a large number of which, entrenched approaches to dispute handing are now under radical re-examination;
- Balancing theoretical and practical concerns, the principal areas of discourse and practice that the student will come to understand are the processes of negotiation and mediation.
- The student will understand these processes in their own right and also in the context of the emergence of new types of dispute resolution professional, who offer mediation and other services as alternatives to the lawyer's often preferred practice of late settlement through litigation.

5. <u>SUBJECT – LAW ON CORPORATE FINANCE</u>

- Apart from imbibing knowledge of law, the course allows learners to acquire skills by understanding subjects like Finance, Marketing and Management, as well as some unique courses like Data Science and Artificial Intelligence, Corporate Finance, Business Environment, Business Communication etc. and their influence and interdependence on Law.
- As students also get exposure to subjects like seminar paper, legal writing, moot court, internship, professional ethics in the course give an edge to the learners for international outreach and business.
- The program allows learners to understand law in much more detail, thus helping them become better management professionals with comprehensive understanding of law.

- To help students recognize and assert their legal right of freedom of speech and expression, privacy and at the same time analyses the restrictions, including the regulatory frameworks and to apply the same to emerging media.
